

Besides our "in-house" training resources, we also attend conferences whenever possible. Both staff and students participated in the Better Man Conference, Promise Keepers and Global Leadership Summit just this past year. With the rate of suicide, overdose deaths and substance-abuse-related instability made worse by COVID, several Staff members enrolled in the comprehensive course, Mental Health Coach First Responder Training through Light University. We want to be trained and ready to serve the broken people God brings us, especially in our current world environment of lost hope.

A DAY IN THE LIFE OF OUR STUDENTS - MANNY JENKINS

The students wake up at 6:00 a.m. every morning, except Sunday, to begin their journey in building a strong foundation in Christ for their lives.

At 6:30 a.m. **George Boone**, our Kitchen Supervisor, makes sure a good, healthy breakfast is served to our students. Directly after breakfast, each student has a daily chore such as cleaning the kitchen, restrooms, classroom, Chapel, and all common areas. With a 37-acre ranch and two dormitories there's plenty of chores to go around.

At 7:30 a.m. we begin prayer and devotions in the Chapel, students begin this time with private devotion and prayer. Each day a student and a staff member give a 10-minute devotion each. We have praise and worship time between the devotions.

Classes begin at 8:30 a.m. with PSNL (Personal Studies for New Life). The curriculum is personalized for each student's uniqueness and individualized personality. It includes a Teen Challenge workbook on a particular subject, Scripture memorizations, and the development of character qualities for personal growth. The GSNL (Group Studies for New Life) classes are taught by a qualified teacher and the many volunteers and partners of our ministry. Fourteen curriculum subjects are in the GSNL series and are taught in rotation. The students have a GSNL project study guide workbook to work on during the week and a final test is given on Fridays.

Around 12:00 p.m lunch is served. At 12:45 p.m. students begin work enterprises so they can learn skills to transfer to the outside world once they complete the program. Some work assignments are on the ranch, and others are the Strong Hands enterprise and Quality Construction where students are hired to work outside the ranch by the surrounding community.

At 5:30 p.m., after a hard day's work, dinner is served. After dinner, there are different events on the ranch from 6:00-7:00 p.m. Some of the events include Study Hall, Celebrate Recovery (offsite), **Chapel Services**, and **Restoring Dignity Class (for Upper Phase Students)**. In particular, Wednesday night chapel services are conducted by Teen Challenge staff and participating volunteers who bring the Word of God. On Friday prayer nights, the students have their corporate time to encourage one another and pray for themselves and their families. That is followed by free time so the students can play board games, play sports, exercise, lift weights, or just relax or do leisure reading.

Our day ends with a quiet time at 9:30 p.m. and lights out for bedtime at 10 p.m. Our entire goal is to restore hope and dignity to each student and their families.

Sundays are special for us. It is a time for church services and bi-monthly family gatherings on the ranch. First and Second Phase students usually go to our home church while Third Phase students have the right to attend the church of their choice. We are often invited to do a presentation at various churches to share about the program. Our Executive Director, Rick Souza, gives the message to the assembly during these occasions. A few students share their favorite scriptures and what they mean to them personally. The FHA& TC student body performs a few choir songs at each outing for the worship segment.

Family Day visits are usually the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month. Our purpose for this day is to promote family unity and reconciliation. We recognize that it is important for students to have contact with their **families and friends that support them**. The schedule for the family gathering is from 1:00-4:00 p.m. Families are encouraged to attend the 4:00 p.m. chapel services on the ranch. This is a time for music and worship, student testimonies, and an inspirational message or film. In addition, we may have special events, special speakers and concerts during this time slot. A few times a year we have a water baptismal service during the family-day visits.

GEORGE BOONE - ON CELEBRATING RECOVERY



Hello, my name is George Boone. I was first introduced to Celebrate Recovery in 2020, while I was still a student in Teen Challenge. It was such a refreshing feeling being around like-minded people outside of Teen Challenge. The worship team at CR was awesome! In April I attended Gratitude Night for the very first time and I also received my very first sobriety chip being 18 months clean.

My love for Celebrate Recovery grew. I got myself a sponsor, I joined a 12-step men's group, and also completed my 12-step class 10 months later. I'm an encouragement coach on the leadership team. I co-lead small group meetings. Starting January, my sponsor and I will be leading another 12-step men's group.

All of this is done in sync with Faith Home Adult & Teen Challenge. The men from the ranch attend Celebrate Recovery every Monday night. It is a wonderful Christian ministry.
